Design Review: September 11 Commemorative

The Citizens Coinage Advisory Committee met at the U.S. Mint's Washington, D.C. headquarters on March 1st, to consider designs for the 2011 National September 11th Memorial & Museum Commemorative Silver Medals. The medal will mark the 10th anniversary of the attacks in New York and Washington, as well as the crash of Flight 93 in Pennsylvania.

Authorized by Congress, the Medals will be sold by the U.S. Mint. The price will include a \$10 surcharge that will go to the National September 11 Memorial & Museum at the World Trade Center to support its operations.

According to public law, the designs for the September 11th Medals "shall be emblematic of the courage, sacrifice, and strength of those individuals who perished in the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, the bravery of those who risked their lives to save others that day, and the endurance, resilience, and hope of those who survived." Each medal is also required to be inscribed "2001-2011" and "Always Remember."

The Mint Seeks Public Input

The recently enacted **Coin Modernization, Oversight, and Continuity Act of 2010** gives the U.S. Mint authority to conduct studies for alternative metallic coinage materials, and requires the Mint to consider factors that the public believes the Mint should consider to be appropriate and in the public interest. To that end, The Mint is requesting public comment on a variety of factors, including: effect of materials on the current suppliers; acceptability of physical, chemical, metallurgical and technical characteristics of new materials; fabrication, minting, and distribution costs; availability and sources; "coinability;" durability; sorting, handling, packaging and vending machine considerations; appearance; environmental and public safety risks; and resistance to counterfeiting. The Mint is **not** soliciting recommendations on specific materials, and any such suggestions will not be considered at this time. Comments must be submitted on or before **April 4, 2011**. When Buying Coins on e-bay: 12 key points to consider

Part 1 of 2 (Part 2 will be included in April issue)

1) Check the seller's feedback

eBay posts buyers' comments and compiles a "feedback rating" based on buyers comments. Click on the "View seller's feedback" link. A box on the feedback page shows the number of positive, negative, and neutral ratings for the past six months. Be cautious of interacting with sellers who don't have much of a track record.

2) Analyze the feedback

Complaints from users that coins received were inferior to their eBay descriptions suggest that the seller may be one you should avoid. Check for the "B" or "S" on the right side of feedback comments. "B" means the person receiving feedback was the buyer; "S" means he or she was the seller. Even if the feedback rating is over 100, beware if most of feedbacks show a "B." A trader can make a series of \$5 and \$10 purchases to build up a positive rating, then use the positive rating to scam people into buying overpriced or never-delivered big-ticket items.

3) Visit seller's "ME" page

Every eBay seller can create a "ME" page. If they have, a "ME" icon appears in each of their listings, to the right of the user ID and rating. Click on it and check out the seller's self-description. See if there is a name and/or company name, street address, and phone number. See if there are banking and professional references. If there is no "ME" page, or if the "ME" page does not contain a name, address, and phone number, don't buy.

4) Know your seller's location

eBay attracts sellers from all over the world and their location is listed on each offer. It is recommended that purchases only be made from sellers located in the US, which also avoids problems with customs, higher shipping fees, and long waits for delivery. If you purchase from a foreign seller, make sure you verify their credibility.
