Coin Profile: Capped Bust Half Dollars

In this month's auction, there are several lots of 50 cent pieces dating from the early 19th century. What's their story? Read on...

Around 1800, immigration to the new world from the old picked up. Many sought to flee the ravages of the Napoleonic wars. And the end of the revolution, the establishment of the Constitutional Government. and over 2 million square kilometers recently bought from the French through the Louisiana Purchase added up to expansive new opportunities in America.

Johann Matthaus Reich from Bavaria took advantage of the scenario. Reich was a skilled engraver who sold himself into indentured servitude in order to finance his passage to the

United States, settling in Philadelphia. In 1801, an unidentified officer of the US Mint purchased Reich's freedom, and he was able to gain part-time employment there.

Reich became assistant engraver to Robert Scot at the US Mint in 1807. The new Mint Director, Robert



Patterson assigned Reich the task of redesigning most of the coins then in circulation. Reich began with the two most important coins for commerce, the half

He designed the Capped Bust Half Dollars (Lettered Edge)

which were produced from 1807 to 1836. Half dollars of this time are appealing to collectors due to the numerous varieties. Dies were made individually, which made letter styles, stars, date placements and many other features vary widely.

The obverse of these silver coins consists of a left facing portrait of Liberty with long flowing hair, and a



mob cap with the inscribed with "LIBERTY" on its band. The bucolic Miss Liberty was quite different than the more classic look of the preceding Robert Scot Draped Bust design. The portrait is encircled with thirteen stars with the

date below.

The reverse features an eagle with a heraldic shield symbolizing the Union on its breast. It holds in its claws three arrows symbolizing strength and an olive branch

representing peace. The coin features a lettered edge with the inscription: "FIFTY CENTS OR HALF A DOLLAR." Reich used his own signature device of a small notch on the outside point of the 13th star.

By 1815 what John Reich had accomplished, for the first time in U.S. Mint history, was to create a set of circulating coins with a common obverse device that of the Capped Liberty. It was first rendered on the half dollar of 1807, the dime of 1809 and finally the quarter in 1815.


Ever Been to a CCAC Meeting?

The Citizens Coinage Advisory Committee will meet at 9:00 am on Wednesday, May 25, 2011 to review designs and draft narratives for several coins and a Congressional Gold Medal. The committee, which advises the Secretary of the Treasury on themes and designs pertaining to United States coinage, will be reviewing several issues, including:

- Reverse designs for the 2012 National Infantry Museum and Soldier Center Commemorative Coin Program
- Reverse designs for the 100th Infantry Battalion, the 442nd Regimental Combat Team, the Military Intelligence Service, collectively, Congressional Gold Medal
- 2013 and 2014 Native America \$1 Coin Program.

The CCAC meeting will be held in *Conference Room A* on the 2nd Floor at the United States Mint Headquarters, which is located at 801 9th St. NW, Washington, D.C. 20220. The public and news media are invited to attend this meeting, which is estimated to last approximately 4 hours. *Interested persons should call the CCAC HOTLINE at (202) 354-7502 for the latest update on meeting time and room location.*
