A Royal Win for ACC Member John Mercer

On January 11, 2013, Numismatic Guaranty Corporation (NGC), the official grading service of the American Numismatic Association and the Professional Numismatists' Guild, announced the NGC Collector's Society 2012 NGC Registry Award Winners.

ACC member John Mercer's Young Victoria Collection was awarded the Best in Category in World Coin Competitive Sets, Sovereign (Victoria) 1838-1901, Circulation Issue. Shield sovereigns are gold sovereigns bearing the bust of the young Queen Victoria designed by William Wyon on the obverse and a crowned royal shield on the reverse. They were minted from her coronation in 1838 until 1874. John states that the objective of his collection was to obtain a sovereign from each year of issue from the London mint in extremely fine or better condition.



According to the NGC, two limitations to the Competitive Set category prevented listing some of the finest coins in The Young Victoria Collection.

First, the competition stipulates that all coins have to be NGC graded. This prevented inclusion of what NGC called "perhaps the finest coin in the collection," an 1861 Sovereign graded Mint State 64 by the Professional Coin Grading Service (PCGS).



Second, The Competitive Sets exclude any coins that are not professionally graded, regardless of their condition. This prevented inclusion of two of the rarest coins in The Young Victoria Collection, each possibly the finest example of its type known, according to NGC.

"Despite these significant omissions, the Extremely Fine or better examples of all years in the collection's scope, with only a few variants unrepresented, led to 2012's award" reports the NGC. Our congratulations go out to John on this truly remarkable and inspiring achievement!

About the collector:



John was born in California in 1957 and spent most of his early life in Oklahoma. From 1975 until 2000, John served a 20+ year career in the US Army. After leaving the service, he continued working in the defense sector as a consultant supporting the US Departments of the Army and Defense until 2008. John now lives "semi-retired," in Northern Virginia.

Coins of the Realm: America

ACC member **George Koelsch** has been collecting coins for decades, and he's one of those individuals who really appreciates what he's gotten out of the hobby. As a way to share his knowledge with others, George has authored several articles on coin collecting. A piece that surveyed software programs related to numismatics won a Heath Numismatic Award in 1996.

More recently, Koelsch, who works as a systems engineer for SAIC, has

turned his thoughts and efforts to attracting more young people to coin collecting. He believes using technology can help. "I wondered how I could take advantage of the popularity of online gaming such as *World of Warcraft*," he explains. (For those not familiar with WoW, it is a hugely successful online game that is played by many players whose characters interact in a continually evolving fantasy world.) "I put my mind to it, and came up with what I affectionately call the *World of Warcraft* for coin collecting!"

Its acronym is CORA, or *Coins of the Realm: America*, a game where you can collect US coins by travelling through time. "Starting in 1850 or level one," explains George, "you will be able to collect whatever coins the various US mints have produced since 1793, interacting with other CORA collectors on the Internet." Like other video games, the object is to advance to higher levels, and navigate challenges such as steering clear of counterfeits and accumulating enough money to acquire the coins you covet.

The game is in the early stages of development, but plans include dimensions such as legal services that allow players to combine collections, or create businesses such as coin shops, auction services, or flea markets. Players will also be able to travel to cities throughout North America to collect different coins produced by various mints. Whether you get from one place to another by train or plane, of course, will depend upon what year it is...

As George continues to turn his vision into reality, we hope to hear regular updates on his progress on the third Wednesday of each month!
