# Looking to the Mint for Holiday Gifts? *Now is a good time!*

The week of November 18, the United States Mint will introduce its three-coin set of Mount Rushmore quarters, its McKinley 1\$ Coin & Medal Set, a 10-coin set of 2013 America the Beautiful Quarters in circulating quality and Edith Roosevelt First Spouse Gold Coins.

Circulating-quality versions of the quarter debuted earlier this month. This set includes a proof and two uncirculated Mount Rushmore quarters bound within a display card. The proof coin comes from the San Francisco Mint. Beside it is an uncirculated quarter from the Denver Mint and an uncirculated quarter from the Philadelphia Mint. The price of the 2013 Mount Rushmore Quarters Three-Coin Set is \$9.95.



On Tuesday November 19, the U.S. Mint will begin selling its 2013 McKinley Presidential \$1 Coin & First Spouse Medal Set. Bound within a display card are an uncirculated William McKinley Presidential \$1 Coin, and an Ida McKinley bronze medal bearing a likeness to the First Spouse Gold Coins for her that launched on Thursday, November 14. It too will be priced at \$9.95.

Then on Thursday, Nov. 21, the U.S. Mint will release its 2013 America the Beautiful Quarters Circulating Coin Set, priced at \$5.95. Included within the 10-coin set are Denver- and Philadelphia-struck quarters featuring this year's five designs commemorating White Mountain National Forest in New Hampshire, Perry's Victory and International Peace Memorial in Ohio, Great Basin National Park in Nevada, Fort McHenry National Monument and Historic Shrine in Maryland and Mount Rushmore National Memorial in South Dakota.

Also on Thursday, the rollout begins for West Point struck Edith Roosevelt First Spouse Gold Coins in proof and uncirculated qualities. These one-half ounce, 24 karat gold coins bear a portrait of Edith on their obverse and have a reverse of the White House with a slightly off-center column and compass. This scene depicts Edith's work in restoring the White House.Pricing of the gold coins will be set on Wednesday, November 20. According to the mint, if gold remains within \$1,250 – \$1,299.99, the proof will be \$840 and the uncirculated \$820.

## Looking Ahead to 2014: The U.S. Mint Throws a Curve!

The National Baseball Hall of Fame Commemorative \$5 gold, \$1 silver, and one-half dollar clad coins will have a shape such that the obverse is concave and the reverse is convex. While these will be the first curved coins ever minted by the United States Mint, it did produce the curved 1973 Roberto Clemente Congressional Gold Medal in honor of the late Pittsburgh Pirates star right fielder.

The National Baseball Commemorative Coin Act specifically refers to modeling the coins after the convex/concave 2009 International Year of Astronomy Coins minted and issued by the Monnaie de Paris (French Mint). The United States Mint's National Baseball Hall of Fame Commemorative \$5 gold, the \$1 silver and one-half dollar clad coins will also be closely modeled after the Royal Australian Mint's Southern Cross curved coins.

Research and development on the curved National Baseball Hall of Fame Commemorative Coins is unprecedented in recent United States Mint history. It covered height of relief limitations; milling, turning and grinding operations; coinability issues; laser frosting and proof polishing; and proof, uncirculated and clad test strikes. During the planning phase for the minting and production of its first-ever curved coins, the Royal Australian and Perth Mints provided valuable technical insight to the United States Mint.

These coins are being issued in recognition and celebration of the National Baseball Hall of Fame, which celebrates its 75th anniversary in 2014. They are scheduled to go on sale early in 2014.

The obverse design depicts a glove that, combined with the baseball design featured on the reverse, exemplifies the most basic elements of our national pastime or a simple game of catch in the backyard or at the local sandlot. The glove design also highlights the unique concavity of the coin.

The winning design was submitted by Cassie McFarland was selected from the finalists by the Department of the Treasury after consultation with the National Baseball Hall of Fame and U.S. Commission of Fine Arts and review by the Citizens Coinage Advisory Committee.

The common inscriptions on each coin's "baseball mitt" obverse are *LIBERTY*, *IN GOD WE TRUST*, and *2014*. The obverse design was sculpted by United States Mint Sculptor-Engraver Don Everhart.

# US Mint Silver Eagle Sales Reach ✓ Record 40,175,000!

On November 12, the United States Mint announced that a new record has been set for sales of American Silver Eagle bullion coins. The previous record of 39,868,500 ounces was set in 2011.

.Of the top twenty Silver Eagle sales months since the bullion coins debuted 27 years ago, eight belong to 2013. Annual Silver Eagle sales totals traditionally include coins minted and dated from multiple years as coin inventories from previous years are generally sold in the first few weeks of the following year. This was not the case for 2013, however, as 2012-dated bullion Silver Eagles sold out in mid-December.

January of 2013 was a notable record month, when the U.S. Mint registered sales of 7,498,000 ounces, the all-time monthly high. The supply ran out in mid-January and was built back up by month's end, but the scenario dictated a limited allocation per buyer that is currently in place. The final weekly supply will be issued December 9<sup>th</sup>, and orders for 2014 silver Eagles will be accepted on January 13<sup>th</sup>.

American Silver Eagles are struck from one ounce of .999 fine silver. Each bears Adolph A. Weinman's "Walking Liberty" design on the obverse and John Mercanti's heraldic eagle with shield on the reverse.

Produced at both the West Point Mint and San Francisco Mint, bullion Silver Eagles are sold through the Mint's network of authorized purchasers. These purchasers obtain the coins in bulk and then resell them in smaller quantities at at premium above the current spot price of the silver they contain.
