US Mint Releases Sand Dunes



The fourth issue in the U.S. Mint's 2014 quarter series features the Great Sand Dunes National Park of Colorado's high desert. This is the 24th overall

in the America the Beautiful Quarters® Program.

The issue depicts a father and son playing in the sand near a creek, with the park's mountains in the background. The park is located in south central Colorado, about 120 miles southwest of Pueblo CO. U.S. Mint Sculptor/Engraver Don Everhart designed and engraved the piece.

The Great Sand Dune quarters were released on August 25th.

COIN TRIVIA

Today we have Sacagawea, but do you know on what coin Chief Black Fish appeared?

Chief Black Fish appears with Daniel Boone on the reverse of the Daniel Boone Bicentennial half dollar (1934-1938).

Boone was captured by Shawnee Indians and lived with them for several months. Chief Black Fish adopted Boone as his son.

This coin was first struck from 1934 to 1938 to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the famous frontiersman's birth. After the first year 1935, the date "1934" was struck above the words "Pioneer Year" on the reverse of the coin.

Did You Know?



Do you know what specific area of the United States the 20-cent coin created for? The 20-cent coin was authorized March 3, 1875, for the Western states where the Spanish "bit" had become equivalent to a U.S. dime. The 20-cent coin was short lived 1875-1878, but only for collectors in the final two years.

Although the Mint had given the twenty-cent piece a smooth rim, rather than the reeded one like on the quarter, the two pieces were immediately confused. At 22 millimeters (0.87 in), the twenty-cent piece was only slightly smaller than the quarter at 24.3 millimeters (0.96 in), and the two pieces had near-identical obverses. Mistakes in change-making were widespread, and the twenty-cent piece quickly became extremely unpopular.

In March 1877, Mint Director Henry Linderman authorized the melting of 12,359 twenty-cent pieces at Carson City. This included almost the entire mintage from 1876 (about 10,000) and created one of the great American numismatic rarities, the 1876-CC twenty-cent piece.

Guidelines for submitting coins for the monthly auction



When submitting coins for the monthly auction always try to use the printed club submission form. The club form lists the current submission rules. To conserve printing costs, take one or two blank forms and make addition copies as needed. Submit individual coins in a flip or 2x2 holder. Flatten the staples of a 2x2 holder with pliers. This will protect your coins as well as the submissions of others from damage caused by the raised staples when coins are stacked for transporting. When completing the submission form always verify the date and mint mark on your coin. Coins submitted without a reserve minimum tend to sell for higher prices than submissions with a reserve that's close to the actual value.
