
COIN TRIVIA

Early Morgan Dollars Refresher

The first reverse had eight tail feathers and parallel edges on the arrow feathers (PAF).

The second reverse (reverse of 1878) also has parallel edges on the arrow feathers, the eagle breast is flat and the first "A" in AMERICA" touches the wing. The beak is hooked and the coin has a narrow rim. The second reverse has seven tail feathers.

The third reverse (reverse of 1879) has tapered or slanted arrow feathers (SAF), a raised and rounded breast, the "A" in "AMERICA" does not touch the wing and the rim is wide. The third reverse has seven tail feathers.

ANACS Grading at ACC Coin Show

ANACS, Geoff Fultz, will have a table on stage at the ACC coin show. Robin will have a form at the January Coin Club meeting so folks can prepare their coins for grading. An ANACS special deal at the show: \$10 for per coin with 10 submissions. Coins should be place in $2\frac{1}{2}$ x $2\frac{1}{2}$ Mylar flips for grading.

1982 Copper vs. Zinc Cents?

How do you tell the 1982 copper-plated zinc cents from the copper cents?

The simplest way to tell the 1982 Lincoln cents composed of 95 percent copper, 5 percent zinc from the 1982 Lincoln cents composed of 97.5 percent zinc, 2.5 percent copper is to use a digital scale. A tabletop digital scale that weighs in grams or ounces would be perfect.

Copper cents have a weight of 3.11 grams or 0.10 ounce; zinc cents have a weight of 2.5 grams or 0.08 ounce. Weighing them on a properly calibrated digital scale will clearly separate the two. There likely will be some variance of a few tenths or hundredths of a gram. Seven different Lincoln cents were issued in 1982 for circulation three composed of copper and four of zinc.

Illustrations showing the differences, such as the difference between the Large Date and Small Date varieties, can be found in *A Guide Book of United States Coins*.

Revised Auction Rules to be voted upon

at January Meeting

ACC Board Recommends 5% Fee for Reserve Bids (was 2%)

(A) The current fees are as follows for reserve bids:

If a reserved bid is placed on a coin and it sells the charge will be 5% of the highest bid. If it does not sell the charge will be 2% of the reserve bid price.

Example: \$50 coin with a \$30 reserve. If it sells for \$50 the seller would pay a fee 5% of the \$50 or \$2.50. If it did not sell the seller would pay 2% of the \$30 or \$0.60.

(B) Suggested change:

If a reserved bid is placed on a coin and it sells the charge will be 5% of the highest bid. If it does not sell the charge will be 5% of the reserve bid price.

Example: \$50 coin with a \$30 reserve. If it sells for \$50 the seller would pay a fee 5% of the \$50 or \$2.50. If it did not sell the seller would pay 5% of the \$30 or \$1.50 (just like it sold for \$30).



Guidelines for submitting coins for the monthly auction

When submitting coins for the monthly auction always try to use the printed club submission form. The club form lists the current submission rules. To conserve printing costs, take one or two blank forms and make addition copies as needed. Submit individual coin in a flip or 2x2 holder. Flatten the staples of a 2x2 holder with pliers. This will protect your coins as well as the submissions of others from damage caused by the raised staples when coins are stacked for transporting. When completing the submission form always verify the date and mint mark on your coin. Coins submitted without a reserve minimum tend to sell for higher prices than submissions with a reserve that's close to the actual value.

Estimating Value of Auction Lots:

Coin World values is a retail price guide for problem free coins that are nice for the grade. A coin may have the bold detail of an extremely fine (EF) coin but if it's corroded, bent, and holed, it doesn't have the value of an EF coin.

Problem coins are downgraded sometimes two or three grades depending on the severity of the problem. Some extremely rare coins, a 1793 Chain Cent for example, are expected to be found with problems and are not downgraded for minor problems. Other more common coins may be downgraded to only melt (or cull) value for severe problems. Cull coins are not appropriate for auction except in the case of a group lot with a melt value of at least \$15.00 (current club auction minimum value).

Coins may be net graded because of severe problems or may be listed at the technical grade with the problem noted. It is up to the buyer to determine what price he is willing to pay, the estimated value is the opinion of the auction chairman using Coin World values magazine.
