OF GOLD COINS OFF ISRAEL'S MEDITERRANEAN COAST



Scuba divers have discovered a record haul of 2,000 coins, the largest trove of gold coins ever found off Israel's Mediterranean coast – dating back to era of Fatimid Caliphate which ruled much of the Middle East and North Africa from 909 to 1171, the country's antiquities authority said.

"The largest treasure of gold coins discovered in Israel was found on the seabed in the ancient harbor in Caesarea," the authority said in a statement.

It was by pure chance that members of a diving club in the Roman-era port had come across the coins, which the authority said weighed nine kilograms (almost 20 pounds) but described as "priceless".

At first they thought they had spotted a toy coin from a game and it was only after they understood the coin was the real thing that they collected several coins and quickly returned to the shore in order to inform the director of the dive club about their find.

Kobi Sharvit, director of the marine archaeology unit at the Israel Antiquities Authority, said excavations would be carried out in the hope of shedding more light on the origin of the treasure.

Sharvit said: "There is probably a shipwreck there of an official treasury boat which was on its way to the central government in Egypt with taxes that had been collected." "Or perhaps the treasure of coins was meant to pay the salaries of the Fatimid military garrison which was stationed in Caesarea and protected the city." Another theory is the treasure was money belonging to a large merchant ship that traded with the coastal cities and the port on the Mediterranean Sea and sank there.

The Israeli Antiquities Authority declined to put a cash value on the coins, which it said had been exposed as a result of winter storms.

The find was "so valuable that it's priceless," Yoli Schwartz told AFP, adding the haul was now the property of the state, and that there was no finder's fee.

Reserve Auction Rules voted on at February 25th Meeting

Members present at the February 25th meeting of the ACC discussed and voted on the reserve auction fees. The options were voted on and the majority decided to keep the current reserve fees the same. The current fees are as follows for reserve bids: If a reserved bid is placed on a coin and it sells the charge will be 5% of the highest bid. If it does not sell the charge will be 2% of the reserve bid price.

Guidelines for submitting coins for the monthly auction

When submitting coins for the monthly auction always try to use the printed club submission form. The club form lists the current submission

rules. To conserve printing costs, take one or two blank forms and make addition copies as needed. Submit individual coin in a flip or 2x2 holder. Flatten the staples of a 2x2 holder with pliers. This will protect your coins as well



as the submissions of others from damage caused by the raised staples when coins are stacked for transporting. When completing the submission form always verify the date and mint mark on your coin. Coins submitted without a reserve minimum tend to sell for higher prices than submissions with a reserve that's close to the actual value.

Estimating the Value of Auction Lots:

Coin World values is a retail price guide for problem free coins that are nice for the grade. A coin may have the bold detail of an extremely fine (EF) coin but if it's corroded, bent, and holed, it doesn't have the value of an EF coin.

Problem coins are downgraded sometimes two or three grades depending on the severity of the problem. Some extremely rare coins, a 1793 Chain Cent for example, are expected to be found with problems and are not downgraded for minor problems. Other more common coins may be downgraded to only melt (or cull) value for severe problems. Cull coins are not appropriate for auction except in the case of a group lot with a melt value of at least \$15.00 (current club auction minimum value).

Coins may be net graded because of severe problems or may be listed at the technical grade with the problem noted. It is up to the buyer to determine what price he is willing to pay, the estimated value is the opinion of the auction chairman using Coin World values magazine.

1937-D 3-Leg Buffalo

Since the coins release over 75 years ago, it has become recognized as an optional yet highly desired part of a buffalo nickel set.

According to Walter Breen, a new mint employee named Mr. Young is responsible for creating this variety. During a production run, the planchet feeder jammed and the dies clashed together leaving traces of one image on the other die. Rather than changing the dies, Mr. Young smoothed out the clash marks and in doing so removed part of the buffalo's right front leg. By the time the error was discovered, several thousand (?) strikes were mixed in with normal strikes.

The mint decided not to pick out the errors and placed the coins into normal circulation. Soon it became one of the most popular varieties in the series. One result of its popularity is it became one of the most faked coins of the 20th century. Most fakes are done by removing part of the front leg. Fortunately, several diagnostics identify a genuine coin from a fake. On the real variety the P of Pluribus and the U of Unum are clearly separate from the buffalo's back. On normal strikes both of those letters touch the back. Other diagnostics include a weakly struck rear leg and a series of raised dots below the animal's belly.

With so many forgeries available, it is a good idea to have the coin authenticated. Values for the coin according to the PCGS price guide range from \$500 in good to \$2,400 in MS60 all the way to \$67,500 in MS66.

Population reports for MS66 and up from PCGS and NGC add up to 26 coins. Some of these coins may be re-submissions seeking a higher grade so a more realistic figure may be 15-20 pieces.
