## Three Cent Pieces

The three cent coin has an unusual history. It was proposed in 1851 during the Civil War both as a result of the decrease in postage rates from five cents to three cents and to answer the need for a small-denomination, easy-to-handle coin.



#### Three Cent Pieces (Silver) 1851 - 1873

The silver three cent piece was the smallest U.S. coin ever minted; and was coined after the Act of March 3, 1851. These coins feature a six pointed star on the obverse with a shield in the

center. The reverse features a Roman numeral III enclosed within a "C" - encircled by small stars.



From 1854 to 1858 there were three lines bordering the



star on the obverse.

1859 to 1873 there were only two lines bordering the star.

From 1854 to 1873 the reverse displayed an olive branch above the III, and a small bundle of arrows below. It was

designed by James B. Longacre and is composed of 75% silver and 25% copper, with a plain edge, it weighs .8 g,



and has a diameter of 14 mm. It was minted at Philadelphia and New Orleans from 1851 to 1853.

Starting in 1854 to 1873, the three cent silver had its silver metal content raised to 90% and 10% copper in order to encourage circulation. At the same time, its weight was reduced to .75 g, by reducing thickness. All were coined at Philadelphia

The silver three cent piece was discontinued by the Coinage Act of 1873.



#### Three Cent Pieces (Nickel) 1865 - 1889

This replacement for the three cent silver piece was designed after the Civil War by James B. Longacre. It's composition is 75% copper and 25% nickel, it's weight is 1.94 g, and has a diameter of 17.9 mm with a plain edge. It features Miss Liberty's profile on the obverse and a large Roman numeral III surrounded by a wreath on the reverse. The design remained consistent throughout the duration of it's mintage. All were minted in Philadelphia.

# Show or Storm Rules!

The rules are simple – if the Alexandria Public Schools are closed that day or evening, we have

# Guidelines for submitting coins for the monthly auction

When submitting coins for the monthly auction always use the printed club submission form. The club form lists the current submission rules. To conserve printing costs, take one or two blank forms and make addition copies as needed.



Submit individual coin in a flip or 2x2 holder. Flatten the staples of a 2x2 holder with pliers. This will protect your coins as well as the submissions of others from damage caused by the raised

staples when coins are stacked for transporting. When completing the submission form always verify the date and mint mark on your coin. Coins submitted without a reserve minimum tend to sell for higher prices than submissions with a reserve that's close to the actual value.

# Estimating the Value of Auction Lots:

Coin World values is a retail price guide for problem free coins that are nice for the grade. A coin may have the bold detail of an extremely fine (EF) coin but if it's corroded, bent, and holed, it doesn't have the value of an EF coin.

Problem coins are downgraded sometimes two or three grades depending on the severity of the problem. Some extremely rare coins, a 1793 Chain Cent for example, are expected to be found with problems and are not downgraded for minor problems. Other more common coins may be downgraded to only melt (or cull) value for severe problems. Cull coins are not appropriate for auction except in the case of a group lot with a melt value of at least \$15.00 (current club auction minimum value).

Coins may be net graded because of severe problems or may be listed at the technical grade with the problem noted. It is up to the buyer to determine what price he is willing to pay, the estimated value is the opinion of the auction chairman using Coin World values magazine.
